For the last nine years, our Foundation has maintained a four-star charity rating, and for the past five years, we have been awarded a 'perfect 100' score from the charity watchdog organization Charity Navigator.*

Because of the generosity of our donors, fundraisers, and volunteers, the Navy SEAL Foundation continues to be the #1 benevolent serving NSW. 

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Scholarships for the warriors and families of Naval Special Warfare was the first program the Foundation provided back in 2000. Since that time, we have never forgotten that access to exceptional education is a cornerstone of success. Through our educational support, we empower active-duty NSW personnel, their spouses, children, and our SEAL and SWCC veterans by awarding scholarships for higher education. We also support quality education options for dependent children in geographically separated duty locations where choices matter to the student's overall success. NSF provides funding for standardized college entrance exams for gualified applicants, and we facilitate the use of top-teir programs like SEALKIDS and Gratitude Initiative.

The NSF's educational support augments funding accessible through Navy programs and provides additional financial resources that would not otherwise be available. The support of our mission helps guarantee members of the NSW community can pursue educational goals that are crucial to their success.

TRAGEDY ASSISTANCE AND SURVIVOR SUPPORT

The Naval Special Warfare community is intimately familiar with the meaning of sacrifice. Their work is inherently dangerous, and their enemies are unconventional and numerous. To be effective, they must train as they fight, and their training is constant and intense.

If an NSW service member or a member of their immediate family becomes critically ill or is injured, the Navy SEAL Foundation steps in and provides logistical and financial support. Additionally, we provide support for NSW service members who experience the loss of a parent, sibling or child.

When an active-duty NSW service member passes away, the Navy SEAL Foundation provides the surviving family with immediate financial assistance to offset any unexpected expenses. We help cover costs associated with memorial services and receptions, and we provide the service member's command with additional resources.

Long-term support, including mortgage and rent assistance, home maintenance funds, a variety of counseling services, and supplemental childcare, is also provided to the families of the Fallen. We are honored to continue our care of NSW Gold Star and Surviving Family members following their loss through specialized camps, retreats, and events that foster resilience and healing.



TRANSITION ASSISTANCE AND VETERAN SUPPORT

When the time comes for a Naval Special Warfare warrior to separate or retire from active-duty service, we believe they should have the opportunity to physically, mentally and intellectually recalibrate before embarking on their next mission in the civilian world--whatever that mission may be.

The NSF is honored to provide our multifaceted Transition Program to members of the NSW community who are within 18-months of separation. We also support SEAL and SWCC veterans who have already separated from active-duty service on a case-by-case basis.

NSF's Transition Program takes the 'whole warrior' approach to this very important time in any service member's career. We individually tailor our support to meet their needs in three main areas: human performance, the family unit, and professional development for post-service career opportunities.

We have partnered with world-class providers and service organizations that specialize in successful warrior transition, focusing our effort and energy on the best possible outcomes for each of our transitioning NSW members.

NSF hosts and facilitates special events like our "Frogman Reconnect" gatherings where former SEALs come together as teammates once again and rebuild the bonds of brotherhood that are often severed when a SEAL leaves active-duty service. Our goal is to keep the brotherhood connected, making sure these warriors always have a swim buddy and never lose touch with their NSW family.

To meet the needs of our SEAL and SWCC veteran population, NSF developed the Veterans Crisis Assistance Program. This program provides financial assistance to SEAL and SWCC veterans to cover a variety of critical needs. We also support those SEAL and SWCC veterans who were wounded or who become ill due to their active-duty service.

The Navy SEAL Foundation executes its mission with transparency and efficiency. Each year the Foundation is independently audited by RSM US LLP, one of the United States' most respected audit firms with its own rich history of integrity and due diligence. NSF's key financials, including IRS filings, are available by request or by visiting the Foundation's website: navySEALfoundation.org.

Since 2011, the Navy SEAL Foundation has maintained the highest four-outof-four star rating from Charity Navigator, the number one charity evaluation organization in America. Charity Navigator carefully analyzes the financial efficiency and administrative accountability of over 9,000 nonprofit organizations and reports their findings at charitynavigator.org. The Navy SEAL Foundation has also maintained a 'Perfect 100' score from Charity Navigator for the last five years, placing it in the top 1% of all rated charities.

Additionally, NSF is listed as a "Best in Amerca" charity, and it is a Platinum Level member of the Guidestar Exchange, a title that can only be achieved through accurate and timely reporting of financials and programmatic impact.

94 cents of every dollar donated to the Foundation in 2019 was used to support programmatic initiatives for the Naval Special Warfare (NSW) community or was retained for future mission use, including long-term program support for Gold Star and Surviving Families.* In 2019, the Foundation invested \$19.8 million in programs for SEALs, SWCCS, NSW enablers, their families, the families of the fallen and SEAL and SWCC veterans.

An all-volunteer Board of Directors composed mainly of former SEALs and NSW community members governs the Foundation and is Chaired by retired Vice Admiral Sean A. Pybus. NSF executes its daily mission under the leadership and guidance of Chief Executive Officer Robin King.


